NEW MEXICO HISTORY MUSEUM

This new museum includes permanent and temporary exhibitions that span the early history of indigenous people, Spanish colonization, the Mexican Period, and travel and commerce on the legendary Santa Fe Trail. Period rooms and exhibitions

at the Palace tell tales of nearly 400 years of New Mexico history starting with Francisco Vasquez de Coronado's 1540 expedition. A visit to this museum gives explanation to so much of what you see and experience in Santa Fe today.

New Mexico Museum of Art

The early Art Gallery's "open door" policy encouraged artists in New Mexico to exhibit their work, since Santa Fe's commercial gallery network was years away. That welcome, mixed with the excitement about New Mexico that was generated by the tourism industry, enticed artists with formal training from other parts of the country. The resulting blending and cross-influences of Native American, Hispanic, and European-based cultures created a unique body of work that is the basis of the New Mexico Museum of Art collection. Georgia O'Keeffe Museum

The Museum is dedicated to the artistic legacy of Georgia O'Keeffe, her life, American Modernism, and public engagement. It is the only museum in the world dedicated to an internationally known American woman artist. One of the most significant artists of the 20th century, Georgia O'Keeffe (1887-1986) was devoted to creating imagery that expressed what she called "the wideness and wonder of the world as I live in it." She was a leading member of the Stieglitz Circle artists, headed by Alfred Stieglitz, America's first advocate of modern art in America.

EL RANCHO DE LAS GOLONDRINAS is a living history museum on 200 acres in a rural farming valley just south of Santa Fe. It is dedicated to the history, heritage and culture of 18th -19th century New Mexico. Original colonial buildings date from the early 1700s. Historic buildings from other parts of northern New Mexico have been reconstructed at Las Golondrinas and villagers clothed in the styles of the times show life on the frontier. Festivals and events offer a look into the celebrations, music, dance and other aspects of life in the Spanish, Mexican and Territorial periods of the Southwest.
